




Shortly we had another person come up and ask us if we were a Thunderbird Club. See the Car of the Month later in this issue for that outcome.

Tech Note Follow Up

A couple of issues ago Mike Press told us about some potential problems with the quality of oil filters. I just ran into a study of oil filters done by a group at www.GMtruckcentral.com.

The following website details the testing methods used and the results. Price DOES NOT mean a better

I think these results have been well accepted and this group proceeded to also test air filters. You can find those methods and results at http://www.gmtruckcentral.com/articles/air-filter-study.html

I can't get the charts to reduce to a size for the Wing so if you aren't internet savy let me know and I will print a copy of the chart and send it to you.

Cause and Effect Tech Mysteries and Luck

Have you ever found that sometimes working out one problem clears up others? This is often true with our somewhat elderly cars. Case in point; Our Florida friend Gabe's multiple problems with one ultimate cure.

Gabe takes pride in the way he maintains his '64 Roadster and is usually right after the least little thing that isn't right. However, just before moving to Florida he had some indications that his alternator wasn't charging correctly. The car, of course, went to a local high end classic car service shop – which here will not be named. Of several people in the shop Gabe was directed to the "electrical specialist". The problem was correctly diagnosed as a bad alternator and the alternator was "rebuilt". Shortly thereafter Gabe returned to the shop with a complaint that the Charge indicator was again registering discharge at idle.

Upon explaining the problem to the "electrical specialist" Gabe was told that this sometimes occurs in this particular alternator but that it was easily fixed by replacing the standard pulley with a smaller one – which was done. The problem seemed fixed and Gabe then shipped the car to Florida where he was making his new home.

After a short while in Florida it was noticed that the charge indicator was still on the edge of discharge at low speed, there was also some noise in the radio and somewhat reduced engine performance both of which Gabe felt was likely caused by old ignition cables. Of course Gabe put in brand new cables and did some carburetor adjusting Things seemed a bit better after that but still not quite right, looking at vacuum readings revealed a marginal and varying vacuum though the compression was nearly

excellent on all cylinders. Then the charge indicator again started showing heavier discharge at stop lights.

There are two people who Gabe uses as his tech advisors, a retired Ford mechanic in Florida and me. He contacted both of us with his problem. The consensus was that one or some of the diodes in the alternator were bad. "But it was just rebuilt" came Gabe's reply. Again the response was unanimous; that there was a diode problem. Gabe at this point hadn't mentioned the radio noise or poor performance.

The Ford mechanic recommended a local alternator repair service and Gabe took the alternator to him. Yes – there were bad diodes. The cause is unknown as is the quality of the California rebuild but it seems that the small pulley was used to mask the problem which actually started occurring in California.

The repaired alternator with a correct pulley was placed on the car and the charge showed normal, the radio was also working much better, engine performance improved and the vacuum reading became excellent. Again the question of why was asked. When asked if he had electronic ignition Gabe's reply was that he had a Pertronix system. Electrical noise will certainly cause this type of system to intermittently behave poorly and will cause a radio to become noisy. What likely happened was that the bad diodes were creating noise pulses, rapid pulsed drops in voltage faster than what could be handled by the voltage regulator, to get into the car's electrical system. The ignition system and radio were being influenced by this and the ignition system was causing misfiring that could create a poor engine vacuum.

While no one put an oscilloscope on the system the proof seems to be that when Gabe finally had a properly operating alternator all of the other problems disappeared. Sometimes mysteries are solved by serendipity.
