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Greetings clubmates-an interesting and familiar discussion arose among some of my online Thunderbird pals recently: Was the 1955 Thunderbird intended as direct competition for the Corvette? That's a question with lots of answers which usually include words such as "sports car" and "personal luxury car" along with comparisons of powerplants, roll-up windows, roof options, and a host of other car-related details. Less frequently included in the discussion are the 1950-1957 American marketplace, other car companies, the global economy, and niche marketing. There's more to the car business than any particular model, and Americans over the past century have rarely embraced two-seat cars in large numbers. But playing along with the TBird v. Vette discussion, take a look at the other players on the scene between 1950-1957. Chevrolet and Ford were competing in the two-seater market with American manufacturers as well as European companies aiming squarely at the U.S. car buyer. Presumably Ford and GM felt the need to enter that market segment, and once there they contended with all comers. But how strong was that segment? Would success there bring success in the far more lucrative family-car segment? Here's a snapshot of the American two-seater landscape of the 1950s.

- Nash-Healey: \$5,908.00, first U.S.built post-war sports roadster. 506 units produced 1951-1954. Clark Kent drove one on TV.
- Jaguar XK140: \$3455.00, 7,500
 export units 1954-1957, primarily for
 the North American market.
 Preceded by the XK120 1950-1953.
- Kaiser Darrin: \$3668.00, 441 units produced 1952-1954. Kaiser left the car business in 1955.
- Oldsmobile F-88 and Buick Wildcat Autorama concept cars, 1954: perhaps if the post-war roadster market were stronger GM would have put them into production.
- 1953-1957 Chevrolet Corvette: \$3176.00, 11,589 units produced. Arguably successful over time.
- 1955-1957 Ford Thunderbird: \$2944.00, 53,166 units produced.
 Ford entered the post-war two-seater market later than its competitors and famously exited it by the 1958 model year despite outproducing and underpricing the competition.



Another lightly attended tour but a lot of fun. Actually it was a computer overload. The Computer History Museum was just too much to see and absorb in 2 ½ hours. We could have spent all day there and still not gotten through everything. The museum states that it covers 2000 years of computing so I guess I should have known it would take more than 2 hours.



One of the first computing engines was designed in 1869 by Charles Babbage but never built. 153 years later in 2002 in London, the Babbage Engine was built according to the original plans. It is 11 feet long, has more than 8000 parts and weighs 5

tons. Not really a laptop!



We had a nice range of cars in the parking lot from the two clubs and even got to see a Tesla Roadster sitting in the lot. (This is the car that Elton Musk sent into orbit last month).



The surprise car from our club was brought by Russ Genna. It wasn't a TBird but an earlier "personal luxury" car. The 1942 Lincoln Continental was nicely restored and a very rare car. Only 200 Club Coupes such as this one were produced before production was halted for the war effort.

The VTCI 50th Anniversary International Itinerary

Date: July 11 – 14, 2018 Marriott Tulsa Southern Hills Tulsa, OK Co-written by Tim Pundt and Ed Elzinga

The planning for the VTCI 50th Anniversary International Convention is well underway. Thank you to all of the people who have volunteered their time, services, and things to help promote the 50th Anniversary of the Vintage Thunderbird Club International. The registration form is included in this issue of the Thunderbird Scoop. The plans so far are as follows:

Wednesday, July 11, 2018 early attendees will come and register at the registration desk in the lobby. The meals for this day will be on your own.

Thursday, July 12, 2018 there will be a Board Meeting starting at 8:00 AM to about 9:45 AM. The first portion of the meeting will be Board Members only discussion and the second portion will be the open session for anyone. At 10:00 AM the first tour departs. We will depart the hotel on a motor coach bus to experience the Heart of Route 66 Auto Museum in Sapulpa, OK. This museum is housed in an old decommissioned armory and is the home of the world's tallest gas pump. The auto display is on the drill room floor with a section dedicated to the military use of the building as well as a space dedicated to the Mother Road, Route 66. Next, we will cruise downtown Tulsa for lunch at the intersection of Main and Brady in the Brady Arts District where there are at least seven restaurants to choose from. Lunch will be on your own. After lunch we will walk two blocks to the Center of the Universe where the experience echoes as you speak. Then we will board the bus, drive by the Cyrus Avery Plaza which highlights Route 66, and head for the fairgrounds where the Golden Driller Statue stands watch. After taking pictures, we will drive to the Philbrook Museum of Art, which is rated the number one attraction in Tulsa. The Philbrook is housed in a historic mansion built by the Phillips Petroleum Philanthropist, Waite Phillips. He donated the 72 room mansion to the city of Tulsa in 1938, and the rest is history you won't want to miss. After touring the museum and gardens, we will return to the hotel. There will be a Welcome Reception in the Hospitality Room. Pizza and salads will be furnished by the VTCI. Time will be determined later.

Friday, July 13, 2018 there will be a judges and owners' meeting held at 7:45 AM to 8:45 AM. Then at 9:00 AM we will start our next tour. This can be a driving tour on Route 66. Plan to drive your Thunderbird on the Mother Road, Route 66, but if you didn't bring a car or would rather ride, limited bus transportation is an option. Before we drive on the Mother Road, we will drive one and a half hours Northeast of Tulsa to the Darryl Starbird National Rod and Custom Hall of Fame Museum in Afton, OK. This is a must see auto museum with over 50 custom cars including a few Thunderbirds. After the museum tour, we will drive to Vinita, OK for lunch at a Route 66 venue, which again, will be on your own. When lunch is finished we will hop on Route 66 for a nice 50 plus mile cruise down the

Mother Road. We will stop at Totem Pole Park in Foyil, the Nut House in Verdigris and the famous Blue Whale in Catoosa. At the end of the afternoon, we will arrive back at the hotel, about 4:00 PM. In the evening a Backyard BBQ Buffet will be held. The time will be determined later.

Saturday, July 14, 2018 there will be a brief judges and owners' meeting starting at 8:00 AM to 8:45 AM. The judging of the cars will start promptly at 9:00 AM. All rags are down and no further cleanup of cars after the horn blows at 9:00 AM. At 10:00 AM there will be a shopping trip scheduled to the Woodland Hills Mall about 5-1/2 miles away. The hotel shuttle will take us but we will have to work around the shuttle's schedule if they have a call to pick up people at the airport. The shuttle will come and pick up people at 1:00 PM from the mall. At 6:00 PM we will have the open bar and social hour before the awards banquet. Then at 7:00 PM we will have the awards banquet.

Sunday, July 15, 2018 say goodbyes to one another and be on our way back to home or where ever we are going. Have safe travels. Thank you for supporting the 50th Anniversary Vintage Thunderbird Club International Convention.

Elvira's Spooky 58 Thunderbird.

Mistress of the Dark shows off her George Barris-customized Macabre Mobile.

For those who aren't familiar with this "Mistress of the Dark," where have you been? Locked in a casket? After all, her Goth, sex-kitten character has not only appeared on the TV series Movie Macabre and numerous cult hit-movies, but also on every imaginable type of merchandise.

Elvira, Mistress of the Dark.



Her seductive shape has graced Bally's best-selling pinball machines of all time, along with countless calendars and comic books around the world. Her popularity in turn spawned licensing deals for models of the Macabre Mobile, a '58 Ford Thunderbird customized by the legendary George Barris.

It wasn't always so, and she didn't always have a tricked-out T-bird to prowl around town in during the midnight hour. After stints as a Vegas showgirl and singer in an Italian rock band, not until the fall of 1981 did Cassandra Peterson really hit her stride with the birth of the vampish Elvira

character.

How did she come up with the character? A local Los Angeles TV station was looking for someone to host a show called Fright Night, which would later become Movie Macabre. Her low-cut slinky gown, sensual poses and bawdy wisecracks were an instant sensation. George Barris sums up her character as a "Seesaw . sexy, with those big breasts and cleavage, but a Mistress of the Dark."

From there, Elvira crossed over into movies. For her first film, the namesake Elvira, Mistress of the Dark, Elvira needed a spooky ride in keeping with her ominous yet alluring image. She spotted a black '58 Ford Thunderbird on Melrose Avenue. "That's it!" she cried.

But it was a hardtop, and she wanted a convertible, so Barris and his "kustomizing" crew used a chainsaw to chop off the top. (Sounds like the makings of a massacre movie!) Then they added all sorts of ghoulish embellishments: a spider web in the grille, batwing nose emblem, eyeballs on the fenders, skull-and-crossbones hubcaps, leopard-print

velour upholstery, mini-caskets on the center console and trunk lid, skeleton hands, and a chain-link steering wheel with a skull in the center. The one item that Cassandra supplied was a metal hood ornament, a crouching, winged banshee sculpted with her profile.





Once filming was done, the movie's producers offered this mechanically plagued movie prop to her, and she sold it to a photographer, Lynn Goldsmith, who fixed it up and drove it for several years. About 10 years later, Cassandra bought it back, "real cheap" and keeps it at her house in Ojai, California, to this day.

Now here's the kinda creepy part: While there's only one Elvira, the killer queen of pop kulture, there's actually more

than one Macabre Mobile. It was reproduced like one of those seedpods from the horror classic Invasion of the Body Snatchers, starring Kevin McCarthy.

When we pressed Mr. Barris about the second Macabre Mobile, he notes that there was a need for another one to promote her. Given Elvira's enormous popularity, just one car was not enough. (Consider, too, that there are numerous copies of the Batmobile, plus several Dukes of Hazzard General Lee Chargers and Nash Bridges' Hemi Cuda convertibles).

While the Thunderbird at the Petersen Automotive museum is a knockoff and based on a '59 model instead (the '58 and '59 are very similar, except for a few trim items), it's still legit, since Barris built it, and newspaper photos attest to

the fact that Elvira did appear with the car at a Halloween show she did at Knotts' Berry (Scary) Farm. So think of the second car as a genuine tribute to her enduring popularity.

While she's known for skewering B-grade monster movies with a rapier wit on her TV shows, what's her most hated film? Surprise: Attack of the Killer Tomatoes! "It drives me crazy," Cassandra complains. "It's already a parody, so I couldn't poke fun at it."

How about her automotive interests? Another surprise: She actually once dreamed of becoming a racecar driver. (Imagine her in an Indy car instead of Danica Patrick!) But she settled for owning an odd mix of cars over the years, such as a VW Beetle, '69 Firebird, and BMW 740i. Today, she pilots a Prius, and loves it, being the environmentally conscious type in her private life.

More TV shows and movies are in the works, and she's still drawing big crowds at public appearances, where she breezes along in a badass Barris T-bird while the wolves howl at the full moon and she disappears into the night. Now that's one smokin', spooky ride.
