THE THUNDERBIRD WORKOUT

Greetings clubmates, I'm a big fan of keeping fit, though that may not be the first thing you notice about me what with my Ernest Borgnine physique and all. But I do work at it and I have a fitness tracking wristband device that gives nifty data and cool graphics.

While returning home in El Jefe the other day from an essential trip on Kirker Pass Road between Pittsburg and Concord, I switched the device to "Cycling" mode just to see what the data would look like. By golly, perhaps there's a Thunderbird on the drive to fitness. Speed and elevation gain are what typically fuel the calorie burn hiking and biking in the hills around here. Kirker's a good hill for that, topping out at 945', but admittedly the 390 is doing the work. There's a Bill-in-the-loop coefficient in here somewhere, though the influence on vehicle effort would be minimal. In the 2.83 miles and 3.01 minutes that the device recorded, I managed to burn 11 calories on a 73 bpm average heart rate. My doctor would be impressed (no he wouldn't, he's a serious fellow).

Let's look at the data:

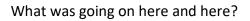
- 3.88 calories/mile. If we drove the 390 miles to Los Angeles from here I'd burn 1516 calories, not bad. Let's stop for a burger and shake in Coalinga, I'll burn it up on the Grapevine.
- 3.66 calories/minute. There are 740 calories in a Carl's Jr. Western Bacon Cheeseburger. That's going to take about 3.5hrs. Concord to Redding, 193 miles at 56.3 mph should almost do it. Again, not really doing much behind the wheel but you can't argue with science.
- 73 bpm average heart rate over 3.01 minutes, but 30 seconds of that was at 111 bpm in two different occurrences. I'll chalk those spikes up to something like a "runner's high" endorphin rush of Thunderbird Bliss as we powered up the grade.

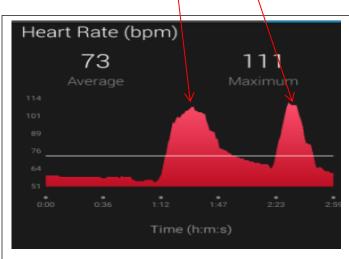
