# President's Message

**Automotive enthusiasts, it's a great, big garage**: Greetings clubmates, I'm going to tell you something that you already know-the car hobby is vast. Racers, restorers, customizers, hot-rodders, lowriders, collectors, drivers, passengers, and that's just what comes to mind at the moment. Each one of those categories has its own zillion permutations and on any given day I'm content to be in any of them.

I see a lot of impressive expressions of the hobby as I attend various car events. That's nothing new, as the car hobby is over a century old now and it was 54 years ago that Tom Wolfe's "The Kandy-Kolored Tangerine-Flake Streamline Baby" appeared in Esquire magazine. But perhaps new to me is the appreciation for other car guys' vision and their efforts in creating and enjoying them. I started out in the hobby as a bored 16 year old searching for glory and a good time behind the mythic wheel of John Milner's '32 Ford, or Danny and Sandy's "Greased Lightning" (Bill and Julie as Travolta and Newton-John, dreaming the dream of dreamers). Among the only two things I had on my mind in those days was a gleaming speedster that all my pals would admire, and anything that wasn't that was contemptable. But the sneering 16 year old has mellowed over the last forty years, and I find myself honestly exclaiming "that's cool!" a lot these days.

Thunderbirds I've seen in the last few years since I've been paying attention include an undriven '66 controvertible that sold for \$77,000.00, a rat rod '62 that was cut into a two-seater, a road-racing 80s Turbo, concours-quality restorations, work-in-progress drivers, more than a few lowriders looking more like they been tattooed than painted, and I'm diggin' every one of them. Thunderbird as history, Thunderbird as art, Thunderbird as "let's go get a burger," Thunderbird as the Racer's Edge. Which one is right? They all are, and that's the beauty of the hobby. Howard mostly owned economy cars because they were inexpensive to keep and operate, which allowed him to enjoy them at will. His love of going for a ride and getting a burger took him to all 50 states during his lifetime, mostly behind the wheel of forgettable cars. The experiences, however, were



unforgettable. He loved the freedom of the road, and the car was merely the vehicle to be run on it. That's a bona fide car guy in my book.
